
Celebrating Women Leaders at Cranbrook

By ensuring students read, listen to and empathise with these female experiences, we are likely to see the most progress and change.

What changes do you hope to see continue to happen in the future?

I hope to see more resources that help to equip young people with the skills, knowledge and confidence to lead in these areas of change – whether that is during their time at school or in institutions beyond this.

What's your funniest/most memorable moment of teaching at Cranbrook?

Walking through the beautiful village of Diskit, Northern India with the students and parents of the 2018 CETOP tour. We stumbled upon a mass gathering of people, wandered towards the main focus of it and found ourselves invited to sit by the side of the Dalai Lama while he delivered a talk on global peace. He spoke with us after this, shook our hands and was amazed that we had travelled all the way from Australia. That was certainly very memorable!

What advice do you have for anyone starting their career in teaching?

The more you put in, the more you will get out of it. If you can – say yes to every opportunity, experience and challenge – you never know where it could take you. For me, that was the other side of the world!
